TO CHOWAN COUNTY TAX PAYERS

Avoid Penalty On Tax By Paying Your Taxes During January

According to action Monday, January 6, 1941, by the Chowan County Commissioners, a penalty will be placed on all 1940 taxes not paid by February 1, 1941.

Beginning February 1, 1941, a penalty of one per cent will be added; on March 1, 1941, another one per cent will be added, and after April 1, 1941, an additional one-half of one per cent will be added for each month until taxes are paid.
