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county's population.

Miss Colwell's report especially startled the Commissioners by the notation that 125 bales of cotton had been used in the work already done. The board expressed itself as believing that a few bales might have been secured and used, but 125 bales were to the Commissioners somewhat astounding. They were also interested in the report's statistics showing that 11,880 yards of ticking had been used so far as well as 7,510 yards of percale.

Of course, there have been no fancy silk coverings placed atop the mattresses or comforters, but to off-

set the silk it can be said the output of the work has been satisfactorily enjoyed to date by 725 Chowan families. Around 1,175 spools of thread have been handed out for the work, 93 pounds of tufting twine, 160 pounds of tuft. The actual cost of the ticking and cotton in each mattress, based on the amount of material used, would be, Miss Colwell said, around \$7.50, and for a comforter, \$1.90. As has been said, all the money received goes to meet material costs, and some of the needles alone used in mattress making run as high as 40 cents each.

This is one welfare project in Chowan in which the citizenship takes pride and the Commissioners expressed themselves as gratified at the report made by Miss Colwell.

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unit, a balance of about \$3,300 appeared in the county unit, of which amount \$1,800 was paid for two buses not in the budget, while a comparative balance was not shown in the Edenton unit. Superintendent W. J. Taylor explained that some of the balance was an accumulation of money coming into the unit over a period of years, but for some reason the Commissioners were at sea as to why a similar balance was not shown in the Edenton unit. Superintendent John A. Holmes, too, was puzzled and determined to tussle with the figures to see how the difference resulted.

The city school budget calls for improvements at the colored school, where six more class rooms will be added and additional toilet facilities provided. According to the plans, the space occupied by four of the class rooms can be easily transformed into a lunch room and used for an assembly room and recreational purposes.

The cost of these improvements will be about \$21,000, of which the taxpayers will pay about \$15,000 by means of a WPA project. None of this expense, however, was included in this year's budget, for it will not get underway until August at least and will, therefore, have to be included in next year's budget. Bonds will be sold, and of course, will be paid off over a period of years.
