

Dinner Meetings Feature Of College 50th Anniversary

Edenton Is Selected as Place of Meeting For Ten Counties

Plans for a series of district dinner meetings as a phase of the alumnae program in celebration during 1941-42 of the 50th anniversary of Woman's College of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, have been announced by Miss Rachel Clifford, secretary of the 50th anniversary committee, who was appointed by that group to arrange the meetings.

The alumnae program, one of four major emphases of the anniversary year, will be launched with a Founders Day conference at the college Saturday, October 4, and the district meetings, 16 in North Carolina and four out of state, will be held between that time and the mid-year business meeting of the Alumnae association next February. District dinner meetings and the commencement celebration are designed to reach the more than 20,000 alumnae and former students of the college, inspire them with the record of the past and unite them in active goals for strengthening the college to meet the needs of young womanhood in the uncertain future.

Dr. W. C. Jackson, dean of administration at the college, and beloved by the alumnae as well as the current crop of students, will be speaker

at the 20 meetings which Miss Clifford is scheduling.

For the district meetings, Miss Clifford is selecting a chairman in each town or city designated as the place for a dinner, and all chapter chairmen in the district are being asked to serve on the committee. Dates will be arranged as rapidly as possible, suiting Dr. Jackson's schedule and events in the districts. Details of the district dinners will be worked out at the Founders Day conference at the college of the local anniversary committees.

Among the 16 districts where meetings are planned, Edenton has been selected for the Albemarle District, comprising Chowan, Currituck, Camden, Pasquotank, Perquimans, Hertford, Bertie, Washington, Tyrrell and Dare.

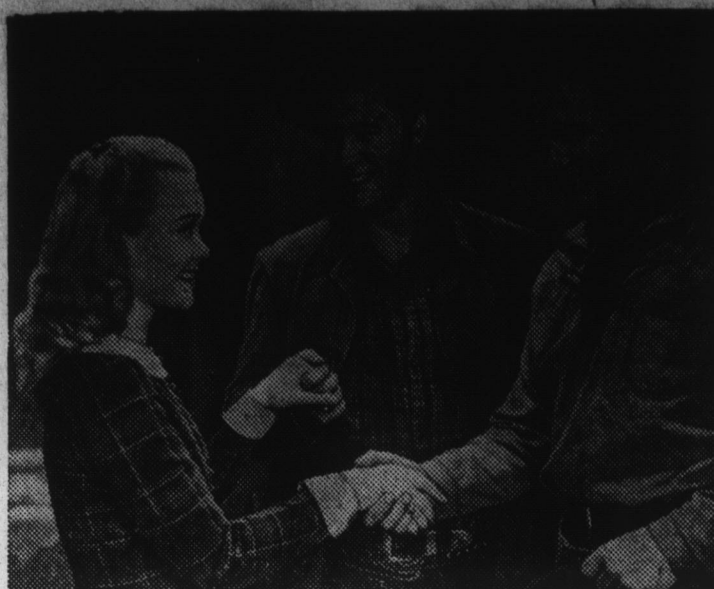
