R. E. McGlaughan, Works Project officer, informed Mr. McCullers today that the shop will be moved here as soon as the building can be made ready for occupancy. It is expected, Mr. McCullers said, that equipment will be moved into the Kramer Building some time next week.

The NYA shop will employ approximately 50 young men between the ages of 17 and 25.
