Chowan County's old Court House was the scene of much interest and pleasantry Monday morning when a portrait of George Monk, Duke of Albemarle, was unveiled in the Assembly Room on the second floor. The portrait, a beautiful reproduction of an original painting, was presented to the County by John and Inglis Fletcher, the latter being the author of "Raleigh's Eden" and "Men of the Albemarle," two books which have resulted in much publicity for North Carolina and the Albemarle in particular.

The Assembly Room was filled with local people, as well as quite a few visitors, all of which provided a scene more or less reminiscent of the Edenton Tea Party of 1774.
