- "The Signpost," Robertson. A stirring love story.
- "Reunion on Strawberry Hill," by Thorpe. An honest and conventionally patterned little story set in the western part of Washington.
- "Heart On Her Sleeve," Kelland. Fast moving tale of attempted sabotage, violent attack and spirited romance.
- "Golden Apples of the Sun," by Obermeyer. This is sheer fantasy, cleverly concealed under the doings of a group of characters so eccentric, and yet so convincing, that whatever happens they make it to seem real.
- "Liana" Gellhorn. A beautifully written book, full of the tropical beauty of a French island in the Caribbean Sea.
- "Dragonwyck," Seton. A delightful historical novel.
- "A Treasury of Great Russian Short Stories," Russian anthology confined to the nineteenth century great and their stories: Dostoevski, Turgenyev, Tolstoy, and others.
- "Again in October," Van Ness. A charmingly adult love story.
- "Winter Wheat," Walker. A sincere, honest and substantial novel.
- "Growing Up," Thirkell. The story of English ladies and gentlemen and their irrepressible children.
- "Yankee Lawyer, the Autobiography of Ephraim Tutt, undoubtedly the best known lawyer now alive.
- "The Harvest Is Late," Downing. An American novel of Peter Oliver, by profession a banker, but whose farm Sundown, held first place in his heart.
- "Liberty Street," Morris. A book of warning for America does not know what is being done in her name.
