#### Effort Will Be Made to Juggle Figures Calling For \$1.00 Rate

Unless the complexion of Edenton's proposed 1944-45 budget is changed at a joint meeting of Town Council and the Board of Public Works at a called meeting this (Thursday) aiternoon at 2 o'clock, the town's tax rate will be at least \$1.10 per hundred dollar property valuation. This figure was arrived at Tuesday night at Town Council's meeting, when W. M. Wilkins, chairman of the Finance Committee, presented anticipated ex-

pared with anticipated revenue. The meeting, as was expected, was long, lasting until well past the midnight hour, but rather than adopt the increased rate, it was decided first to meet with the Board of Public Works in an effort to keep the same rate as last year, which was

According to Mr. Wilkins' figures, an appropriation of \$8,000 is anticipated from the Board of Public Works. Including this item of revenue, expenses have increased so that to main; ain the \$1.00 rate additional revenue of \$3,500 must be forthcoming. It is for the purpose of considering increasing the Board of Public Works' appropriation to \$11,500 instead of \$8,000 that the special meeting for this afternoon is
