Spacious School Auditorium Packed Two **Nights**

Various Numbers Cause Rounds of Thunderous Applause

Exceeding fondest expectations, the U. S. Marine Corps variety show, "A Slight Touch of Genius," proved to be just about the best local talent show ever presented in Edenton, as well as the best drawing card. The entertainment was presented Thursday and Saturday nights at the Edenton High School, the first performance filling the spacious auditorium so that only standing room was available. The Saturday night show was also presented to a full house.

The show was planned primarily for the entertainment of service men and women, who were admitted free. However, in an effort to cooperate in Chowan County's United War Fund drive, the show was virtually turned over to civilians to secure as much as possible in way of admission charged to civilians. A charge of 50 cents was made and, according to J. G. Campen, who was in charge of ticket sales, \$416.50 was realized, all of which will serve as a starter for the drive which will begin next Wednes-

The show resulted in many favorable comments on the part of those who saw it, so that no little credit is due those who planned as well as those who took part.
