Chowan County Commissioners at their meeting Monday unanimously adopted a resolution urging Governor R. Gregg Cherry to favorably consider the reappointment of Richard D. Dixon as a special Superior Court Judge, Mr. Dixon being one of three who were not reappointed by the Governor.


