Alternate Route Suggested Cutting Into Freemason Street

For some time the proposed changing of Route 32 as a post-war project on the part of the State and Federal governments has been the subject of discussion in Edenton, but only on Monday afternoon did local people get a definite idea as to what was proposed and in short order a motion was made and unanimously passed to disapprove the plan as sub-
