## 110 Children At Pre-School Clinics Ending Saturday

### Complete Report Released By Health Department

Pre-school clinics in Chowan County came to a close Saturday and during the four-day clinics 110 children were brought in for examination. Eighty-seven parents accompanied the children to the clinics, while in other cases relatives or neighbors accompanied them.

Reports of the clinics as compiled by the Health Office follow:

Edenton White School—44 present; 25 absent whose names were listed; 6 who didn't need any immunizations; 8 first diphtheria toxoid; 2 second diphtheria toxoid; 21 smallpox; 1 to have first of 4 injections for protection against whooping cough; 57 parents present.

Chowan High School—25 present; 41 absent whose names were listed; 3 who didn't need any immunizations; 1 first diphtheria toxoid; 20 smallpox; 1 to have first of 4 injections for protection against whooping cough; 22 parents present.

Rocky Hook Central School—10 present; none were absent whose names were listed; none who needed any immunizations; none to receive first and second diphtheria toxoid; 9 smallpox; none to have first of 4 injections for protection against whooping cough; 7 parents present.

Hudson Grove—4 present; none absent whose name was listed; none who didn't need any immunizations; none first diphtheria toxoid; 2 second diphtheria toxoid; none to have first of 4 injections for protection against whooping cough; 3 smallpox; 3 blood test; 2 parents present.

Edenton Colored School—7 present; 22 absent whose names were listed; none who didn't need any immunizations; 3 first diphtheria toxoid; 1 second diphtheria toxoid; 2 smallpox; 3 to have first of 4 injections for protection against whooping cough; 7 blood test; 5 parents present.

Ryan's Grove—No prospects for any pre-school children.

White Oak School—6 present; 3 absent whose names were listed; 1 who didn't need any immunizations; 1 first diphtheria toxoid; 2 second diphtheria toxoid; 2 smallpox; none to have first of 4 injections for protection against whooping cough; 6 blood test; 4 parents present.

St. John's School—12 present; none absent whose name was listed; 3 who didn't need any immunizations; none first diphtheria toxoid; 1 second diphtheria toxoid; 6 smallpox; 2 to have first of 4 injections for protection against whooping cough; 12 blood test; 8 parents present.

Green Hall School—7 present; none absent whose name was listed; 1 who didn't need any immunizations; 1 first diphtheria toxoid; 4 second diphtheria toxoid; 2 smallpox; 7 blood test; 5 parents present.

Canaan's Temple—7 present; none absent whose name was listed; 1 who didn't need any immunizations; 2 first diphtheria toxoid; 2 second diphtheria toxoid; 3 smallpox; none to have first of 4 injections for protection against whooping cough; 7 blood test; 5 parents present.

Warren's Grove—5 present; none absent whose name was listed; none who didn't need any immunizations; 3 first diphtheria toxoid; 2 second diphtheria toxoid; 5 smallpox; none

to have first of 4 injections for protection against whooping cough; 5 blood test; 3 parents present.

Virginia Fork—3 present; none absent whose name was listed; none to have first diphtheria toxoid; none to have second diphtheria toxoid; 1 smallpox; none to have first of 4 injections for protection against whooping cough; 3 blood test; 1 parent present.

St. John's School—12 present; none absent whose name was listed; 3 who didn't need any immunizations; none first diphtheria toxoid; 1 second diphtheria toxoid; 6 smallpox; 2 to have first of 4 injections for protection against whooping cough; 12 blood test; 8 parents present.

Green Hall School—7 present; none absent whose name was listed; 1 who didn't need any immunizations; 1 first diphtheria toxoid; 4 second diphtheria toxoid; 2 smallpox; 7 blood test; 6 parents present.

Center Hill—9 present; 1 absent whose name was listed; 1 who didn't need any immunizations; 1 first diphtheria toxoid; none second diphtheria toxoid; 2 smallpox; 2 to have first of 4 injections for protection against whooping cough; 9 blood test; 7 parents present.

Britt's School—1 present; 5 absent whose names were listed; none that didn't need any immunizations; none first diphtheria toxoid; 1 second diphtheria toxoid; none smallpox; 1 blood test; 1 parent present.

The Health Office points out that it has been made a law for each child who is entering school to be protected against diphtheria, whooping cough and smallpox. Children who have not had all of these immunizations are urged to be taken to a family doctor or to the Health Department on Friday or Saturday morning. The Health Department closes at 12 o'clock noon. Parents are urged to bring a certificate to show that children have been protected against these diseases.
