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ism, preserve memories and incidents in world wars, inculcate a sense of obligation to the state and nation, combat autocracy of classes and masses, make right master of might, promote peace and good will on earth, as well as other Legion goals.

He told of the organization of the Legion after veterans of the first World War were given a \$60 bonus and a kick in the portion of the anatomy where it did the most good. He said he is opposed to any veteran or his family being penalized for service rendered to his country and cited several instances where the Legion has stepped in to help a veteran, a veteran's widow and children.

The speaker said he has seen the Legion grow and that he was proud to tell newcomers that they belong to a \$100,000,000 organization. He said he was glad to see new blood coming into the Legion, stating that now 60% of the Legion membership is composed of World War II veterans, who will help to solve problems.

"We were soft eggs after the last war," said Judge Stevens, "when we scuttled our ships and reduced our actual combatant troops to just about the size of the New York police force. We were accused of being war-mongers, but after being drawn into two wars unprepared, I would have liked to yell through a gigantic megaphone, 'we told you so.' Two times we have had time to prepare, but the next time they will start with us and we will not have time to get ready. We will be monkeys if we allow our country to be defenseless, and movements are already in progress to do that very thing."

The speaker said that with atomic developments, a third world war may last not over 12 hours and in closing urged the Legionnaires to carry on in peace for what they fought for in war.
