In a comparatively brief meeting Tuesday night, Town Council officially took over operation and maintenance of Beavers Hill Cemetery in ac cordance with action taken at the previous meeting which was subject to transfer of a deed to the property by the Beaver Hill Cemetery Corporation and the Beaver Hill Cemetery Association. The two groups have passed a resolution to that effect, so that as of Tuesday night the cemetery will be under administration of the Town of Edenton.

Walter M. Williams, Fourth Ward Councilman, has been appointed custodian of the cemetery and will have charge of selling lots, employing a keeper or keepers and to see to it that the cemetery is properly main-
