

A. C. Boyce Attends His Last Meeting As Commissioner

Winds up 14 Years of Service; A. S. Hollowell Successor

Unless there is a special meeting of the Chowan County Commissioners before the first Monday in December, A. C. Boyce, veteran commissioner from the First Township, attended his last meeting as a commissioner Monday. Mr. Boyce has held the office for 14 years, being

next to J. A. Webb in point of service. He will be succeeded by A. S. Hollowell, who won out in the primary election over W. E. Bond, and will take the oath of office at the December meeting.

At Monday's meeting West Byrum, chairman of the Board, took occasion to say, in part, "Though I am a baby in point of service as a commissioner, I, as well as the other Commissioners, have enjoyed working with you. You have been very conscientious and always acted in the interest of the county's taxpayers, so that we hate to see you leave the Board. You have made a very good County Commissioner."

Clerk of Court E. W. Spiros also said that while he not always agreed with Mr. Boyce, he made a good officer, always conscientious in his thoughts and actions, having in mind the conservative expenditure of the county's funds for purposes necessary.

Mr. Boyce, always very modest, said he enjoyed being associated with the other members in an official capacity and that he feels that his successor will carry on in a creditable manner.

Jernigan - Granby Post Sets December 15 For Get Together

Members of the Jernigan-Granby Post of the American Legion are planning to celebrate a homecoming day for colored veterans of World War II on December 15. Golden Frinks, commander of the post, appeared before the County Commissioners Monday and asked for a contribution to go toward defraying the expense involved, which he stated will be in the neighborhood of \$350. The Commissioners, however, declined to make a contribution due to no provision made in the budget, which is in none too good shape at present.

Frinks said the post planned to stage a big parade and dance and a free meal to the veterans, and expected most of the colored veterans to turn out for the affair.

The celebration will be the principal item of business at a meeting of the post tonight (Thursday) at 7:30 o'clock at the Legion hut in the Dorie Miller Club at the base. All veterans, whether members of the post or not, are urged to attend.

Harrellsville Man Burned To Death

Horace Russell, 38, lost his life early Sunday morning when he was burned to death together with the total destruction of the home of Robert Baker near Harrellsville. Russell spent Saturday night with Baker and his brother and during the early morning hours the house caught fire. The cause of the fire is not known.

Russell was burned to a crisp with only his charred bones being found after the fire had burned itself out.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon, with burial taking place in Chowan County. Deceased is survived by his wife and several children.

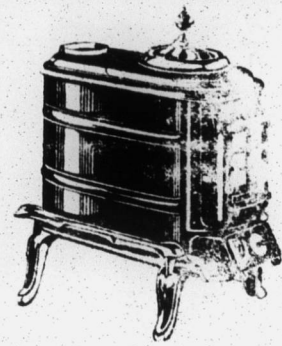
