

SAFE AND SANITARY SEWAGE DISPOSAL RESPONSIBILITY OF HEALTH DEPARTMENT

Privy Situation In County Reaches Stage Where Repairs Are Necessary, Says Sanitation Officer K. J. Eyer

"It has come to the attention of the Health Department," says K. J. Eyer, sanitation officer, "that many home owners are not acquainted with Health Department regulations which require all newly installed septic tanks, privies, water and sewer connections to be inspected by the Health officer or his representative prior to being used.

"Residential sewage installations should be so constructed and located," continued Mr. Eyer, to give proper protection to wells and other water supplies. The micro-organisms of typhoid fever, cholera, dysentery, hookworm and other intestinal dis-

eases have their ultimate source in human discharges, and are often conveyed from person to person through many channels by water, food, soil, contact, sometimes by animals, and particularly by flies.

"The Health Department has for distribution pamphlets covering the specifications for Pit Privies as required by State of North Carolina, also Residential Sewage Disposal Plants. These cover thoroughly how to construct and maintain them.

"The privy situation in many cases throughout the county is now at the stage where they need repairing. The WPA provided this section some years ago with adequate privies in a large majority of the residences. But, the time is now at hand or will be in very near future when there will have to be minor repairs done, particularly new pits dug.

"The Health Department is interested in the construction and location of these installations, and all property owners are asked to cooperate, as it is important an accurate record be kept."

Edenton Bank Adds Photography Unit

Pictures Taken of Every Check Paid Against An Account

W. H. Gardner, vice president of the Bank of Edenton this week announces the addition of a photography service to the bank's equipment which will serve as a protection for depositors as well as the bank.

The new contraption takes pictures of every check paid against the account of a depositor and these films are kept as a permanent record, so that a picture of any check can be produced if and when necessary to prove that a check was written and paid.
