

Edenton Aces Have Hard Time Downing Ahoskie Friday Night

Jack Habit Scampers 62 Yards For Only Score Of Hard Game

SCORE 6-0

Visitors Throw Scare In Edenton Camp Near End of Game

With Dick Hollowell returning the kick-off 26 yards and Jack Habit scampers for a touchdown on the first play of the Edenton-Ahoskie football game on Hicks Field Friday night, it looked as though the Aces would hang up a one-sided score against the visiting team, but this single touchdown was the only score of the game and with the Ahoskie

boys bidding for a touchdown in the closing moments of play, the whistle, no doubt, saved either a tie score or possibly a 7-6 count against the Aces.

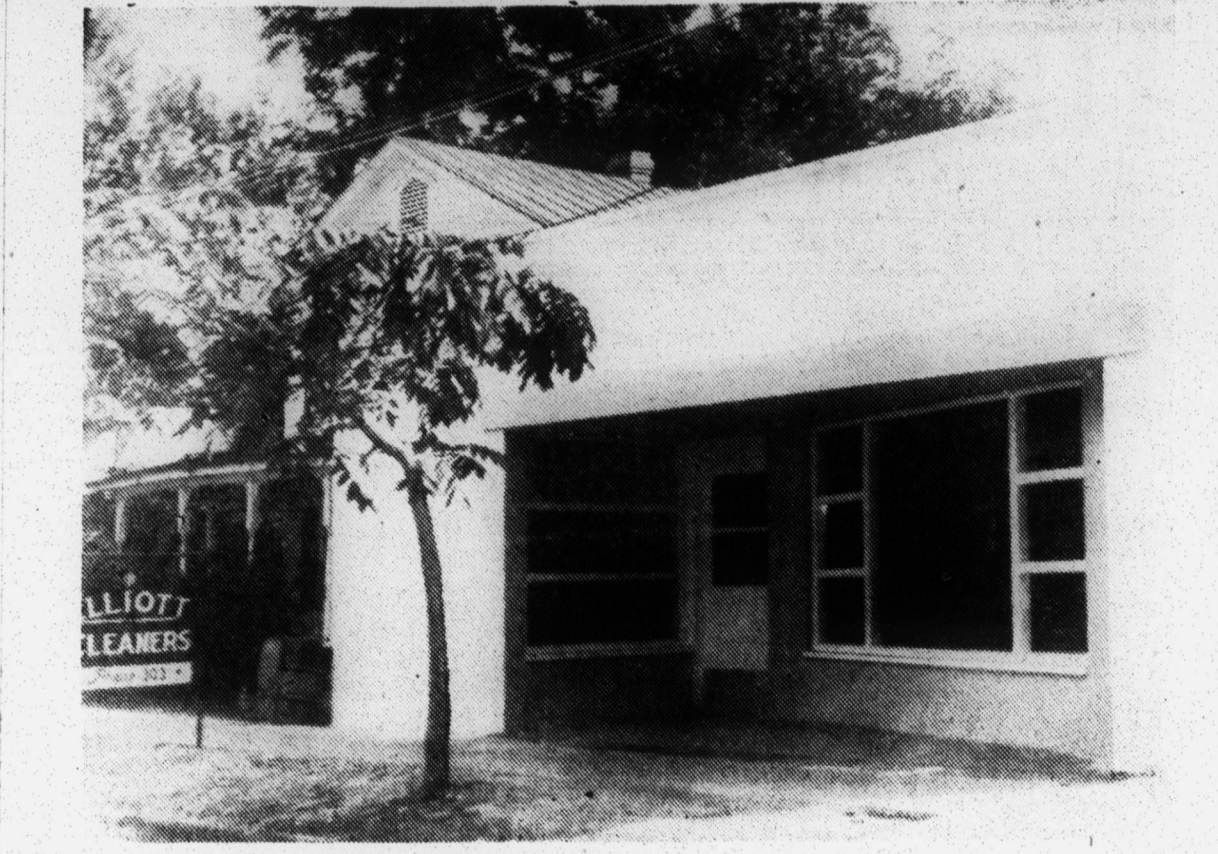
Following the touchdown, the game developed into a rough and tumble affair with many penalties being called, most of which were against the Aces. The Edenton line yielded very little ground, which resulted in the visitors resorting to the air, and with big Tommy Thorne tossing the ball and booting in a fashion comparable to some college players, the Aces were kept uneasy during much of the game.

Ahoskie kicked to start the game and Dick Hollowell reversed his tracks, going to the 38-yard line before being brought down. On the first play, Jack Habit went through a hole at center, cut toward the side-line and, with a splendid exhibition of dodging, aided by nice blocking, he ran 62 yards to the pay-off stripe, being pulled down just over the line. The try for extra point failed, and this wound up the scoring of the game.

Both teams tightened, so that during the remainder of the first quarter the ball saw-sawed back and forth with the Aces chalking up only two first downs and Ahoskie 11. The Aces tried a number of passes during the quarter with only one connecting when Wheeler stabbed a 20-yard pass from Hollowell.

Starting the second quarter, Ralph Ward lost 4 yards, and on the next play Wheeler grabbed a 40-yard pass. Hollowell picked up 9 yards, but the Aces were penalized and were forced to kick. Ahoskie checked out on three first downs and, aided by a 15-yard penalty, the ball rested on the Edenton 10-yard line. Ahoskie fumbled at that point and the Aces recovered, cutting off the scoring threat. Edenton also fumbled but recovered, after which Hollowell gained 20 yards and Ward 15. A pass to Hollowell was good for a first down and Jack Habit pulled his way for another first down, taking the ball to the Ahoskie 13-yard line. A pass failed and Habit gained only one yard through the line. On the next play Ahoskie intercepted a pass, taking the ball back to the 35-yard line as the half ended.

Little headway was made by either team in the third quarter. Hollowell returned Ahoskie's punt to midfield, but the Aces fumbled on the 30-yard line. Ahoskie was forced to kick and Habit and Hollowell registered three first downs and a pass to Wheeler netted 20 yards. With the ball at the Edenton 20-yard line Ralph Ward was thrown for a loss and was injured, be-

ing carried from the field. Hollowell gained 18, but the ball went over to Ahoskie on the 20.

The visitors made a first down on a pass on the last play of the third quarter and in the fourth period Thorne gave a good exhibition of passing, connecting time and again with passes which threw a scare in the Edenton camp. As the game drew to a close Thorne connected four times, the ball going from the Ahoskie 20-yard line to the Edenton 18 as the final whistle blew ending the game.

The Aces were somewhat off their usual form Friday night with several regular players nursing previous injuries. Both teams chalked up 12 first downs during the game, with Ahoskie making six in the final quarter of the game.
