Dr. and Mrs. W. I. Hart left Saturday for New York City, where they are spending this week.

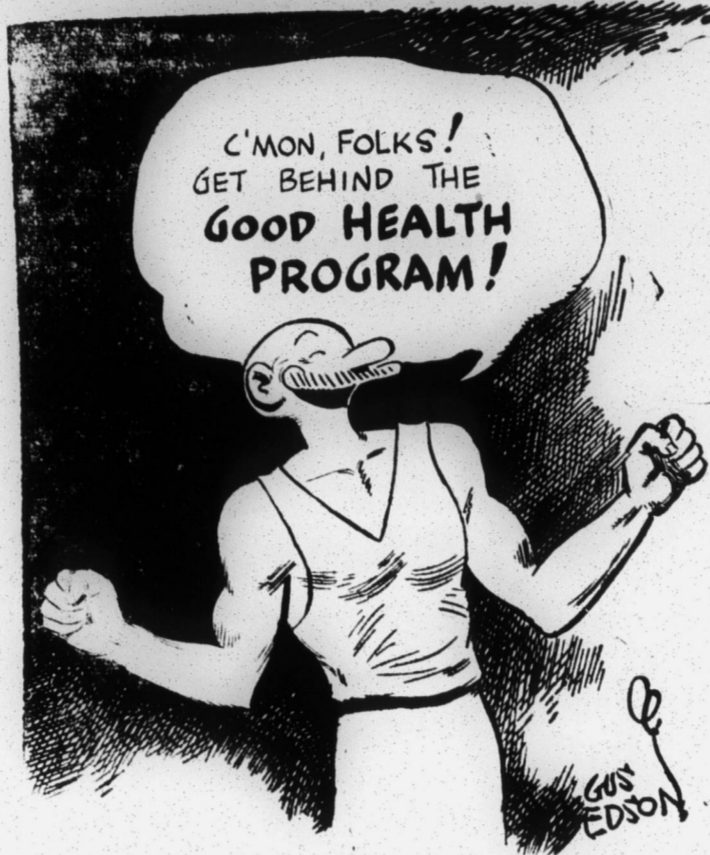

Hobbs, special agent for the Bureau of the Census, 532 bales of cotton were ginned in Chowan County from the 1946 crop prior to November 1, which compares with 897 bales from the 1945 crop at the same time last year.

Funds Lag For Negro Homecoming Affair

Though the Jernigan-Granby Post of the American Legion plans to stage a homecoming day for Negro war veterans on December 5, Golden Frinks, commander of the post, reported early this week that raising of funds to cover the expense involved is discouraging and that unless more progress is made, the celebration will have to be postponed from the date set.

Commander Frinks reports quite a bit of interest among the colored veterans and expresses the belief that if the event is staged, membership in the post will increase 50 per cent. Plans call for one of the most outstanding Negro affairs ever held in Edenton.

1947 Plan Of Work Is Lined Up For Chowan

Plans for extension work for 1947 in Chowan County have been completed, reports C. W. Overman, who says the Chowan County Board of Agriculture felt that the main emphasis during the year should be 4-H club work, improvement in the Jumbo runner type peanut, forestry, cotton and that the progress in sulphur dusting of peanuts should be continued.

Plans for 1947 have been made accordingly, says Mr. Overman, with additional work on other phases of the county's agriculture to balance the program.
