Maggie S. Reeves vs. Charlie Stallings, an action looking to the sale of property for division among heirs, home of whom are opposing a sale.

Herbert S. Small vs. Farmers Cotton & Peanut Co. This action is based upon an alleged breach of contract in refusing to accept and pay for Small's peanut crop.

Guy L. Boyce vs. J. A. Wheeler and S. C. Mills, involving claim and delivery in connection with equipment in sandwich shop at bus station, ownership to which plaintiff claims.

J. Roy Winslow vs. G. B. Morgan and Brooks Morgan, his son. Winslow seeks to recover \$10,000 damages of defendants for an alleged attack upon him while traveling in Gates County in January and also a further sum of \$5,000 as punitive damages.

J. H. Ward vs. Albemarle Lumber Company of Elizabeth City. This is an action to recover damages allegedly done to Ward's car by a truck owned by defendant.
