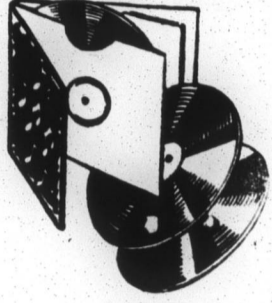


Cotton Sales Last Week Take Drop

numerous, but the volume of sales during the week ending March 29 decreased, with 85,500 bales on the ten markets as compared with 127,000 during the previous week and 157,300 during the same week a year ago. Ginnings from the 1946 crop totaled 8,513,489 running bales according to last week's release by the Bureau of the Census. This figure is approximately 3 per cent under last year and 28 per cent below that of two years ago.

Wildlife Directors Meeting in Durham

Objective Realized, Federation Senses Direct Challenge

With its big objective of the past year accomplished in the recently passed legislative act, separating the Game and Inland Fisheries Division from the State Department of Conservation, the North Carolina Wildlife Federation held a directors' meeting in Durham Monday to outline a program of activity for the next 12 months.

P. K. Gravelly of Rocky Mount, president, made it clear that the Federation will continue to be highly active, emphasizing that it was not formed merely to obtain a new governmental set-up for hunting, fishing and wildlife conservation.

"Passage of the bill to set up a North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission is a direct challenge to our organization, which sponsored the measure," he said, "and we will continue to work, in harmony with the new Commission, for better game laws, more satisfactory supervision and wildlife conservation."

Numbered among the board of directors of the Federation is David Holton of Edenton.
