ing purchased where needed; cash grants being made for transportation in affected area where needed; thousands of welfare inquiries being handled daily.

The American Red Cross has on the disaster scene 42 staff members under direction of Maurice Reddy, one of the most experienced disaster workers in this country. Workers will continue to assist local Red Cross leadership in meeting needs arising from explosion beyond the emergency phase into the field of rehabilitation on a family basis, including food, clothing and maintenance, building and repair, household furnishings, medical, nursing and sanitation, farm supplies, livestock and equipment, occupational training equipment and supplies.
