denying a driver license. The rule mold control in tobacco beds was beds. Blue Mold struck the unsprayed beds, setting the beds back and in some instances, killing as many as 40% of the plants. Many growers did not spray their beds properly chiefly because they were unable to obtain Fermate early and started their spraying too late. Reports from some of these indicate that while they had blue mold it was held under control to some extent and they feel that the spraying was very beneficial. A few growers stopped spraying too soon and blue mold struck the plants just as they were ready for setting in the field. From the various reports received, and personal observations of Mr. Overman, the blue mold disease can be controlled by spraying with Fermate where the spraying schedule is started when the plants are about the size of a dime, as recommended, and thorough sprayings made every three to four days until setting in the field is complete.
