## Two Forest Fire Demonstrations In County Saturday

### Equipment Will Be on Hand to Enlighten Farmers

Two forest fire fighting and control demonstrations are scheduled to be held in Chowan County on next Saturday, June 7, states County Agent C. W. Overman. These demonstrations will be held at 10 o'clock in the morning and at 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon.

The morning demonstration will be held in the woods of John N. and Roy Bunch on the Hertford highway, one half mile from the county line, while the afternoon demonstration will take place in the woods of Bake M. Hollowell on the Suffolk highway, one-half mile from Cross Roads toward Edenton.

These forest fire fighting and control demonstrations are being staged by the North Carolina and Federal Forestry Department cooperating with the County Agent. Heavy equipment for plowing fire lanes to control and stop fires as well as for fire control will be demonstrated. Lighter fire fighting equipment will also be demonstrated. Methods of

preventing and controlling forest fires will be discussed by J. B. Hubbard, District Forester, as well as methods of fighting forest fires.

The public is invited to attend these demonstrations and land owners are especially urged to attend. During the last six years fires have damaged timber and killed hundreds of thousands of young trees. Most of the fires were caused by carelessness of someone.

"Let's study ways and means of preventing forest fires and controlling them once they are started," says Mr. Overman.

### How to Outsmart a River

Maybe you read about the flood in Litchfield County. It never bothered our town—even though the river's only half a mile away.

Seven years ago, the farmers around here got together—and put in a set of flood controls, to regulate high water, and protect our fields. It took a pack of labor and co-operation, but it worked.

We were talking about it in Andy's Garden Tavern, over a friendly glass of beer; and Andy was saying how it was like the brewing industry's Self-Regulation,

as he called it. The brewers work with beer retailers to help them maintain decent, clean taverns. Brewers don't want beer sold in the other kind. This system of moral suasion and self-control works mighty well, too, Andy says.

From where I sit, co-operative regulation is the best way of getting sure results—whether it's keeping our wheat fields healthy, or keeping our taverns neat and clean and law-abiding.
