an upward trend in every phase of the library's activities this year. She says there was a greater increase in attendance than has been experienced since the library has been in operation.

The librarian this week released the following report for the fiscal year ending June 30:

There were 5,028 books circulated, of which 2,600 were circulated in the rural districts.

There were 724 new books added, a contribution of 300 volumes having been donated by Mrs. Charles Nixon of Bridgeport, Conn.

Some new furniture was bought this past year amounting to over \$350. The addition of this furniture makes the library very much more attractive.

Receipts of the library amounted to \$1,390.35, with expenditures netting \$1,304.50.

Trustees of the library made an appeal to the County Commissioners for an increase in the library's appropriation, resulting in an increase of \$15, which brings the county aid up to \$25 per month.

A request was also made for an increase of appropriation by Town Council. The City Fathers agreed to ask the Electric & Water Department to furnish water and lights free hereafter and to increase the appropriation from \$180 to \$250 for the year.

Library trustees and officers express their appreciation for the extra funds allotted the library and invite friends, both white and colored, to visit and inspect the library.

Navy Recruiter In Edenton Each Second And Fourth Tuesday

Robert E. Baker, chief commissary steward, USN, traveling recruiter for the U. S. Navy Recruiting Station in Elizabeth City, will be in Edenton the second and fourth Tuesday of every month from 2 until 5 P. M. Chief Baker states the Navy has a wonderful opportunity for any man between the age of 17 and 31 who meets the qualifications.

"A good future is assured if you enlist for 3, 4 or 6 years, or if you are 17 years of age, you may enlist for a term of minority or 3 years at your option," says the recruiter.

For information about the following, see the nearest U. S. Navy recruiting officer in regard to the opportunities offered in the peacetime Navy. They are as follows:

Activities in the hopper! A band is in the making—a civic council is being planned—a golf club is almost a reality—the first Red Cross Beginners' Course is about finished—An Intermediate Class in Swimming is about to begin—another Beginners' Class will be started next week—A Junior Red Cross Life Saving Class will be started if we can get the teachers. A drum majorette corps is about to be started even before the band is organized—a band concert in August is a certainty with all the members of the Famous Edenton High School Band playing. Townspeople will be asked to make it a "must" to attend, in the interest of forming a band . . . members of the various clubs are busily doing their parts to put the project over.

Walter Holton, Commander of the American Legion Post suggested it would be a good idea if we have a community calendar, so that there will be no mixup in dates of various events, with the possible failure of all due to the conflict. (This is one of the ideas which will be suggested at the Civic Council when it is formed within a few weeks.)

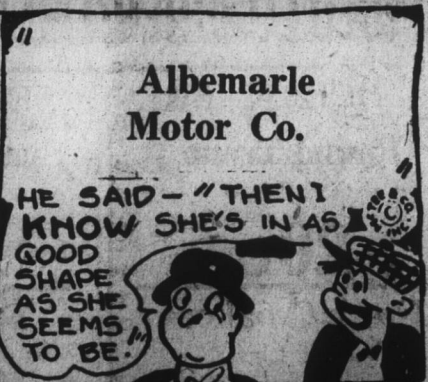
Amount to Be Raised by Taxation \$61,785.00
