

# Shelton W. Moore Dies Suddenly As Result Heart Attack

## Many Attend Funeral Services In Baptist Church Friday

Shelton W. Moore died suddenly at his home on North Broad street shortly after 5 o'clock Wednesday afternoon of last week as the result of a heart attack. His death came as a complete shock to his family and the community, for he had been in his usual health and was attending to his duties on his farm shortly before. During the morning he and his

son had loaded a truck of tobacco which they planned to take to Williamston to sell. Mr. Moore complained of not feeling so well and went home and after resting awhile told his son to take the tobacco as he would be all right after a rest. However, he died a short while later.

Deceased, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Samuel W. Moore, was a native of Perquimans County, but lived in Edenton for the past 33 years. He was a veteran of World War I, having served overseas with Company I, 119th infantry, and had taken an active part in American Legion affairs. He was a past commander of Edward G. Bond Post No. 40. Mr. Moore was also a deputy sheriff of Chowan County at the time of his death and for many years was Chowan County jailer.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Blanche Moore; a son, Shelton Moore, Jr., at home; a daughter, Mrs. R. S. Sutton of Toledo, Ohio; two brothers,

S. Lee Moore and Wayland C. Moore, and four sisters, Mrs. James A. Boyce, Mrs. Wallace Goodwin, Mrs. C. Y. Parrish and Mrs. W. A. Goodwin, all of Edenton.

Funeral services were largely attended Friday afternoon at the Baptist Church with the Revs. R. N. Carroll and E. L. Wells officiating, where a military funeral was held. The color guard was composed of T. C. Byrum, Sheriff J. A. Bunch, West Byrum and W. J. Yates. At the conclusion of the ceremony three rounds were fired by a firing squad from the Edenton Cannon Company and taps were blown by Maurice Bunch, Jr., and West Byrum, Jr.

Active pallbearers were L. S. Byrum, Henry Gardner, Jim Hassell, R. L. Pratt, Thomas Boswell and Walter Riddick, the latter two from Elizabeth City, all of whom served with Mr. Moore overseas in Company I, 119th Infantry. Honorary pallbearers were mem-

bers of Ed Bond Post of the American Legion and John M. Bond of Phoebus, Va., who also served with Mr. Moore overseas.

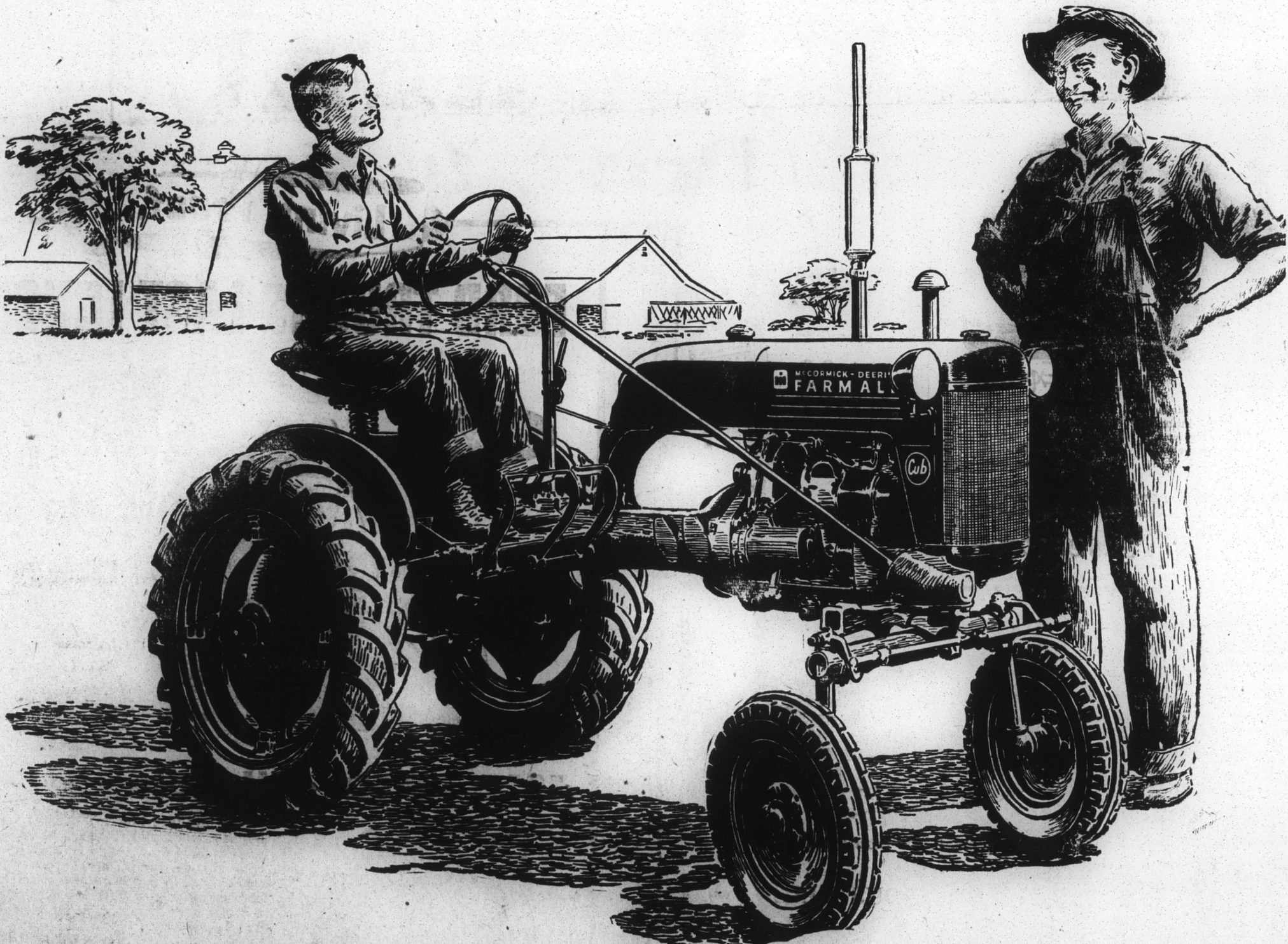
