Funeral services for Lloyd Channing Burton, 59, who died Monday night of last week at his home, following a lingering illness, were held at the home, Wednesday afternoon at 3 o'clock, with the Rev. H. F. Surratt, pastor of the Edenton Methodist Church officiating, assisted by the Rev. E. L. Wells, retired pastor of the Baptist Church. He was a member of the Baptist Church, Masonic Lodge, the Lions Club, a Director of the Edenton Building and Loan Association, Chairman of the County Board of Elections, Vice-President of the Wildlife Club and a former Rotarian.

The son of the late Ethel Walt Burton and Ida Thomas Smith Burton, he was twice married and is survived by his widow of the last union, Mrs. Julia Layden Burton, and two children, Lloyd C. Burton, Jr., and Miss Julia Burton; two daughters by his first wife, the late Mrs. Annie Roberson, Mrs. Marvin Wilson and Miss Mary Arrington Burton. Two sisters, Mrs. Luta Burton Harrison of Norfolk, and Mrs. A. R. Nicholson of Elizabeth City, and one grandchild, James Channing Wilson, also survive.

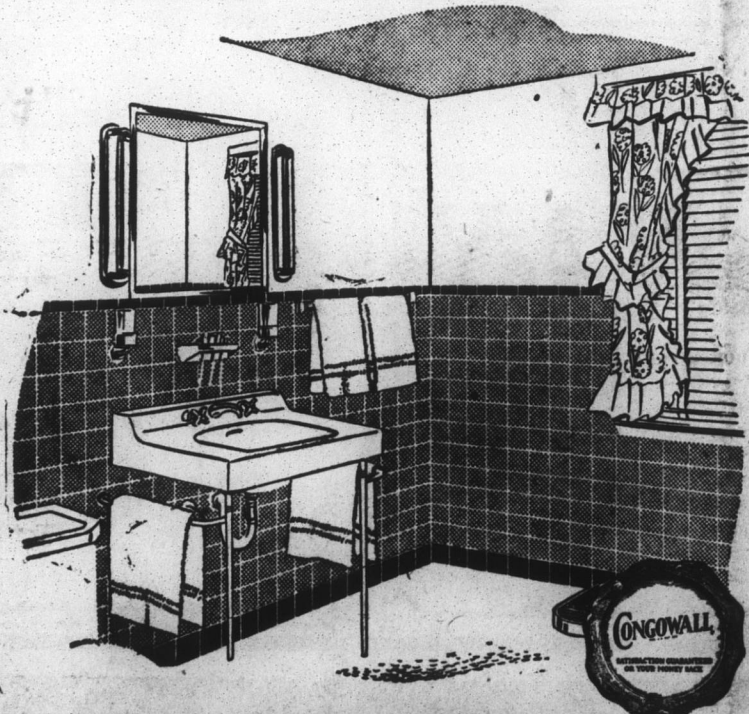
