

Dr. Frank Wood Given Athol House

Sum Also Set Aside to Pay Hospital Lights And Water

Meeting in special session Thursday night of last week, Town Council heard a request from the trustees of Chowan Hospital for use of Athol house by Dr. Frank Wood, surgeon at the hospital. The Athol house was recently put under control of the Town of Edenton as the result of a consent court order by Federal Judge Don Gillam.

Town Councilmen, realizing that it was the intention to furnish the Athol house to Dr. Wood when negotiations were under way for him to return to Edenton, agreed for him to occupy the house. At present, Raymond Umbaugh is in possession of the house and he was notified to vacate within 30 days.

Action of Town Council will result in a saving to the hospital of \$1,200 a year, for rent at the rate of \$100 a month is being paid for the Richard D. Dixon house (Beverly Hall) as a home for Dr. Wood.

During the meeting, in compliance with a request of the hospital trustees, Town Councilmen authorized the Board of Public Works to transfer \$2,400 from its fund which is to be used in paying for lights and water at the hospital. This action will also aid in reducing the deficit in operating the hospital.

It was pointed out that while the hospital will almost certainly show a deficit at the end of the year, the number of patients and income is increasing, which is very encouraging. It was also pointed out that even if the hospital is operated at a loss, it is one of the best assets the town and county has.

Band Fund Now Near \$6,000 Goal

Only \$900 More Needed Up to Tuesday Night To Assure Band

With the County Commissioners on Monday contributing \$500 to the Edenton band fund, the "thermometer" at the Bank of Edenton was given a "shot" which sent the "mercury" up to the \$5,100 mark, leaving only \$900 more to be contributed to realize the \$6,000 goal which will assure a band for Edenton.

While there are still a few more prospects from whom a contribution is anticipated, members of the PTA, sponsors of the movement, feel that they are gradually reaching the vanishing point to collect any more money. However, they have not given up hope, for with the goal in sight they have made up their mind that \$900 will not be between them and the ultimate success of the drive. They are determined and feel confident that \$900 more can and will be raised to make the \$6,000 figure.

Of course, workers believe that some have been inadvertently missed who would make a contribution if solicited. For that reason, a request is made that if anybody will help by making a contribution in any amount to send it to H. A. Campen, treasurer, at once.

Members of the PTA are very much enthused over the cooperation and support they have received and express the opinion that no one will regret the amount he has given to the project when the band is organized and members learn to play.

solvency, and by these actions have made an extremely difficult and trying and costly situation for us. As a result of your action which we contend, and can prove, was entirely without foundation in truth, we entered a counter suit against you for \$100,000 damages and continuing damages of \$10,000 per month as long as this litigation continues.

"Since you placed this matter in the courts, we have from time to time made various proposals to you for settlement out of court promptly, so that we could have an opportunity to begin to go forward again with our enterprise. We have been and are now willing (we make this offer now without prejudice to either party in the pending litigation) to forgive these damaging actions which you have taken against us. In addition, we have offered to return to you practically all of the land and most of the buildings which our lease calls for to comply with all your expressed

desires. The only thing we ask in return is that the litigation be stopped, this unjust receivership dismissed, and we be allowed to go ahead with our operations in these remaining buildings, paying only our own cost of upkeep, and operating as a separate enterprise here on the Naval Air Station.

"Several of your prominent townspeople have expressed the feeling that this was all that was desired by the Town of Edenton and many have expressed appreciation for our present operations which, including the woods and employees necessary to furnish the logs produce a total payroll of about \$1,000 per week.

"We cannot understand why the Town of Edenton refused to either accept or reject any of our offers, or to submit a proposal of your own at any time up to the present.

"The trial is set for a special term of court sometime this month. If we do not hear from you on or before next Monday, November 10, either ac-

cepting our proposal or offering a reasonable one of your own, we shall consider that you wish to force us on into the courts for settlement. If this course is taken, we shall proceed to maintain possession of the property you leased to us, and in addition recover all the damages we have sustained and are sustaining regardless

of what it takes, or how long it takes to do so.

"We sincerely desire to forget the past and want to settle this matter out of court and continue with true friendly association. It seems to us that you have everything to gain by this settlement and certainly we would benefit by the removal of these

unjust and harmful and damaging insolvency charges and the resulting receivership."
