The game was more or less close during the early stages, but the Roanoke Rapids girls gradually forged ahead as the game went on.

Mijrich for Roanoke Rapids led the scoring for the winners with 11 points. Russell Wheeler and Al Habit led for Edenton with eight points each. It was a conference game and thus far the Aces have not registered a conference victory.

Lindsay Delighted With Regular Heat Furnished Armory

Parents Urged to Stop At Armory to Observe Activities

Tex Lindsay, the town's recreation director, this week expressed his appreciation for the Town and County agreeing to furnish heat in the armory.

"Being connected with the various activities at the armory," stated Mr. Lindsay, "gives me a chance to see the needs of those who take part. The armory needs heating regularly only about three months and then as occasions arise. The heat was a necessity."

Activities have grown considerably, according to Mr. Lindsay, who says several basketball teams in the town and county use the armory. Then, too, the high school basketball teams practice regularly and other recreational games take up a considerable amount of time.

A large crowd has been present each Saturday night and Sunday afternoon, in spite of the bad weather, reports Mr. Lindsay.

Mr. Lindsay says he is expecting to take some pictures of the various activities Saturday night, and urges parents to stop in at the armory Saturday nights or Sunday afternoons to get some idea of the program as it is being carried out.

The basketball court has recently been treated and Lindsay says there is a general desire to cooperate in keeping the floor in good condition. Anyone going into the armory is requested not to walk on the floor with street shoes. Seats are not to be pushed across the floor and Mr. Lindsay urges those who are responsible for dances in the armory to see to it that dancing powder or similar preparation is placed on the floor in order to protect it.

(Continued From Page Six) of establishing a Jewish State in Palestine.

The United Nations will have to depend upon the United States to provide some of the military strength required and the net result will be that the United Nations, set up to establish the peace of the world, will touch off a conflict by attempting to impose its decision upon the Arabs.

Secretary of State George C. Marshall advises the United States either to meet the requirements of the European problem or to leave the whole thing alone. He warns that if we are not prepared to assist in the reconstruction of Western Europe, we "must accept the consequences of its collapse into the dictatorship of police states."

Mr. Marshall makes it clear that Russia and the Communist parties of Europe will "oppose and sabotage" our program at every opportunity, but he also declares that the United States can undertake the program with success if it acts in time.

The fact that the Russians, who expect to advance the cause of Communism through chaos, bitterly fight the Marshall Plan, is one of the best evidences that it is what the United States should do. Obviously, the Western nations of Europe, together with the others included in the program, suffered severe damage during the war. Its grand design to rehabilitate their economic processes will inevitably strengthen their governments and make them count for more in the council of the nations.

It might as well be realized in the United States that nations which enjoy the freedoms of civilization are not organized to fight the concentrated power of totalitarian or Communist states.
