Jaycees was that the younger men, most of whom are unemployed, have the opportunity to discuss and suggest projects among themselves, while there naturally is a hesitancy on their part to make suggestions to their older employees.

The Rocky Mount group had on hand a quarterly report of a Western North Carolina Junior Chamber of Commerce which reflected no little activity in salvage campaigns; in agriculture the group welcomed farmers at tobacco warehouses, sponsored a junior dairy and cattle show, worked with county agents in 4-H Club projects and cooperated in 4-H Club Achievement Day; sponsored a Labor Day program and conducted city and county speaking contests; worked with Chamber of Commerce in securing an airport; observed Fire Prevention Week with an extensive program; sponsored project to find ways and means of improving public park services; Jaycees requested to help educate public on water bond; promoting world peace study and speaking program by holding community forums and public speaking contests; inaugurated sponsoring of a football bowl to raise community welfare funds; conducted restaurant sanitary campaigns in order to raise standards of restaurants; sponsored bike safety patrol in 17 local schools; replacing out-moded traffic signs and signals with up-to-date signs, and working with police on year-round basis in traffic safety; sponsored a back-to-church month, working with the ministerial association; sponsored the

building of a Sea Scout base on a lake and a Scoutmasters' training course; sponsored a trade promotion fight in which pamphlets for farmers were dropped from planes; sponsored a National Guard recruiting drive; worked with schools in promoting a boys' choir and junior orchestra; sponsored a Jaycee Halloween party; sponsored food conservation program, Navy Day program, Community Chest, Jaycee minstrel, operetta association, college football game, Red Cross program, summer picnic, bridge social, nursing service, bowling, football and many other activities.

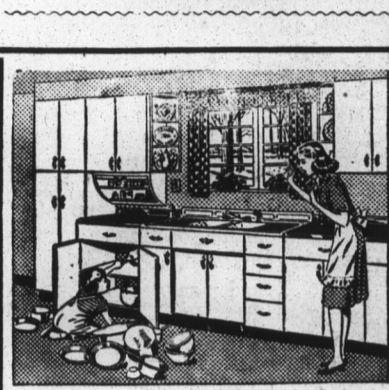
