

## Chowan Increases Saving Bond Sales

### \$11,846 More Purchased In 1947 Than Previous Year

According to figures recently released by State Director Allison James, Chowan County residents purchased \$11,846.65 more in U. S. savings bonds during the year 1947 than for the same period in 1946. A total of \$250,820.25 in bond purchases was made by Chowan residents during 1947 as against \$238,973.60 for the

year 1946. This nice increase in sales indicates increased savings for the residents of Chowan County and has drawn the compliments of the State Department. In commenting on the splendid increase, State Director James adds that Chowan County is to be commended in being among 31 counties in the State to purchase more bonds in 1947 than in 1946. "Again, we find Chowan doing its part," says Director James.

### Vets' Question Box

Q. I was told that my disability, which I claim was due to service, cannot be service-connected because I had it before I entered service. Am I eligible for compensation?

A. If VA decides that your ailment was incurred in or aggravated by your service in the armed forces you will be entitled to receive compensation, if it exists to a compensable degree.

Q. I am a veteran of World War I and would like to know if there is any limit for filing a claim for compensation for disability caused by my war service?

A. There is no time limit set for filing claim for compensation under existing legislation.

Q. I was practically compelled to

sign a statement before my discharge that my disability existed prior to my enlistment. Will this prevent my receiving compensation?

A. Any statement of this nature, according to the Servicemen's Readjustment Act (GI Bill), which you made at discharge is considered null and void. Decision as to service connection of the disability will be made by Veterans Administration based on the service medical record, excluding the statement made at time of discharge.

Q. I have been receiving readjustment allowance from Veterans Administration, and now would like to know if the money that has been paid to me will be deducted from any future bonus that may be authorized by the U. S. Congress?

## HEALTH HINTS

THE blood pressure of the human body is dependent on two conditions—the strength of the heart beat and the resistance offered by the arteries to the flow of blood. The pressure has a normal variation; a higher pressure always following exercise, emotion, and the taking of stimulants and food. This rise in pressure is brought about by contractions of tiny muscle fibers in the walls of the arteries. The action of these muscle fibers gives elasticity to the artery wall, and when they are contracted the resistance to the flow of blood is increased and blood pressure is higher.

The increased pressure due to the four conditions mentioned is temporary and occurs in all healthy bodies. Permanent high blood pressure is unhealthy, and if not corrected, will lead to trouble.

When the resistance to the flow of blood is great the heart must work harder to maintain circulation. If this resistance is permanent the heart muscle is overworked. Nearly all cases of permanent high blood pressure are due to failure of the kidneys to elimin-

ate waste materials from the blood stream. These waste materials produce harmful effects upon the artery walls in three ways: (1) Minute particles are deposited on the vessel walls, making them hard and inelastic. (2) The vessel walls are injured by the foreign materials which causes a growth of the harder tissues in the walls and also renders them hard and inelastic. (3) The delicate nerve endings in the artery walls are irritated and produce a contraction in the muscle fibers so that the walls become tense and contracted. In all three of these conditions the cause lies in failure of the kidneys to eliminate the waste materials from the blood stream.

The kidneys are supplied with nerve force through nerves arising from the spinal cord, and it is because these nerves are impinged and cannot convey the nerve force properly that the kidneys fail to do their work.
