L. S. Byrum Names Registrars and Judges of Election

Machinery was set up this week for Chowan County's Democratic primary election on May 29, when L. S. Byrum, chairman of the Chowan County Board of Elections, announced the appointment of registrars, judges of election and voting places for the six county precincts.

Registration books will be open May 1, 8 and 15 from 9 A. M. to sunset, and members of the Board of Elections urge any voter if he or she is not sure that their name is on the primary books to check with the registrar in his precinct.

Challenge day will be May 22 from 9 A. M. to 3 P. M.
