Purchasers of the bonds were Kirchofer & Arnold Associates and the Branch Banking & Trust Company of Wilson. Messrs. Byrum and Pruden were present in order to register any objection

Both Byrum and Pruden, as well as other County officials, were well pleased with the sale in that the interest rate is some-

what lower than anticipated during the bond issue discussions.

Chowan County joined many other North Carolina counties Saturday in rolling up a vast majority of votes for W. Kerr Scott in the run-off primary election with Charles M. Johnson for Governor of North Carolina. Chowan went for Scott in the first primary election in May, and on Saturday polled 627 votes for Scott, while Johnson's vote was 322. Scott carried every precinct in the county by substantial majorities.

Voting dropped off in the run-off election, when 949 votes were cast as compared with 1,252 in the May primary. In the first election 636 votes went to Scott, 460 for Johnson and the remainder to the other four candi-
