Last November, \$1,784,821 in beer taxes (representing July, August and September collections) was distributed to North Carolina municipalities and counties wherein beer is licensed to be sold. Twenty-six municipalities and 28 counties report that the new beer revenue would enable them to RE-DUCE TAXES, and three other counties said it would help in that direction. Thirty-four municipalities and 34 counties indicated it would aid in PREVENTING
