Ceremony August 22 In Evans Methodist Church

In a beautiful ceremony in Evans Methodist Church Sunday afternoon, August 22, at 5 o'clock, Miss Mary Kathleen Asbell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Henry Asbell, became the bride of George Killebrew, son of Mr. and Mrs. Mack Allen Killebrew of New Bern. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. Earl Meekins.

The bride, who was given in marriage by her father, wore a dress made along princess lines with full skirt ending in a long sweeping train and leg o' mutton sleeves. 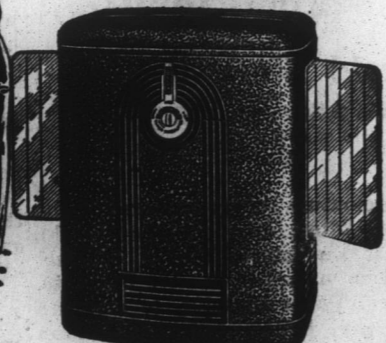
