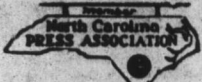

Business Women's Week

With the observance of so many "weeks" it is hard to keep track of them all, but this week is being observed as "Business Women's Week" with the Edenton Business and Professional Women's Club taking an active part. The theme of the week is "Use Your Vote in '48", which in itself is a very worthy effort on the part of the ladies. To be able to cast a vote for public officials is a heritage which every American should appreciate, but which too many treat lightly and even ignore altogether.

The women are not primarily interested in any particular candidate, but they are interested in every eligible voter casting his ballot for public officials. It is hoped that the result of the observance of "Business Women's Week" will stimulate interest in voting, which is not only a privilege but a duty.

The Edenton Club is one of the youngest organizations in Edenton, having been formed in May of this year, and at present the membership totals about 65, with the members representing various business and professions, including a few housewives. The charter is scheduled to be presented to the club Thursday, October 8, although the club already has been very active and a program of activity is planned for the year 1948-49.

Particular objects of the club are: To elevate the standards and promote interest of business and professional women, to bring about a spirit of cooperation among business and professional women in the United States and to extend opportunities to business and professional women through education along lines of industrial, scientific and vocational activities.

if the building is to be preserved, so that the custodians were authorized to investigate the extent of repairs necessary and see what can be done to make them.
Sadie Fayton, librarian of the Brown-Carver Library, attended the meeting and presented a letter regarding the expenditures of library funds. The letter stated that salaries and current expenses must be paid from local appropriations, for which no provision is made by State funds. The present town and county appropriations are not sufficient to meet these expenses, so that Mayor Haskett was instructed to arrange a meeting with proper authorities in an effort to iron out the situation.
Few matters came before Town Council Tuesday night, so that it was one of the shortest meetings held in several months.

ROTARIANS MEET TODAY

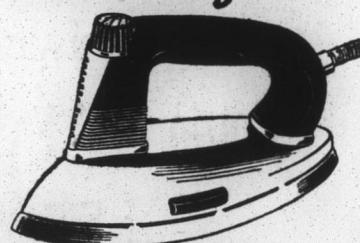
Edenton's Rotary Club will meet today (Thursday) at 1 o'clock in the Parish House. President J. E. Wood urges all Rotarians to be present.

Meal of the Week

Pork Chops with Milk Gravy
Mashed Potatoes
Seasoned Spinach
Sliced Tomato Salad
Bread Butter or Margarine
Ambrosia Floating Island (Recipe below)

Ambrosia Floating Island
Broadcast: October 16, 1948
1/4 cup Fat Milk
3 tablespoons water
2 eggs, separated
7 tablespoons sugar
few grains salt
1 teaspoon grated orange rind
1/4 cup orange juice
1/2 cup shredded coconut
Heat slowly to boiling mixture of milk and water. Stir into mixture of slightly beaten egg yolks, 3 tablespoons sugar, salt and orange rind. Cook over boiling water, stirring until slightly thickened, or about 3 minutes. Remove from heat; stir in orange juice. Pour into shallow quart serving dish. Cover and chill. When ready to serve, beat egg whites until stiff. Beat in slowly remaining 1/4 cup sugar. Drop in 4 "islands" onto chilled custard. Top "islands" with shredded coconut. Garnish with orange sections, if desired. Makes 4 servings.
