

Annual Election For Chowan Member On Conservation Board

Voting Will Be In Progress Dec. 6-11; Two Candidates

The annual election for a committeeman for the Chowan County Board of Soil Conservation Supervisors will be held during the week of December 6 to 11, inclusive. The election this year will be for the purpose of electing one committeeman for the Chowan committee. The term of office for the committeeman to be elected will be three years.

For this election ballot boxes will be distributed as follows: Edenton, Byrum Hardware store; Yeopim, Hobbs' store; Rocky Hock, Bunch's store on December 6, 7 and 8, and at Peele's store on December 9, 10 and 11; Center Hill, V. E. Boyce's store, and Gliden, Briggs' store.

The following men have been nominated by regular petition as provided by the State Soil Conservation District law: Joe A. Webb, Jr., and John N. Bunch. Both of these gentlemen reside in the lower end of Chowan County. Qualified voters may vote for one of these men and are urged to go to one of the above listed polling places to cast their ballots.

Serving at the present time on the Chowan Soil Conservation Committee are Lloyd C. Bunch, R. H. Hollowell and Joe A. Webb, Jr. Mr. Webb's

term will expire on January 1, 1949. The vacancy will be filled by the successful candidate in this election.

Chowan County is a part of the Albemarle Soil Conservation District, which comprises in addition the counties of Camden, Currituck, Pasquotank and Perquimans. Lloyd C. Bunch of Chowan County is president of the Albemarle Soil Conservation District Board of Supervisors at the present time.

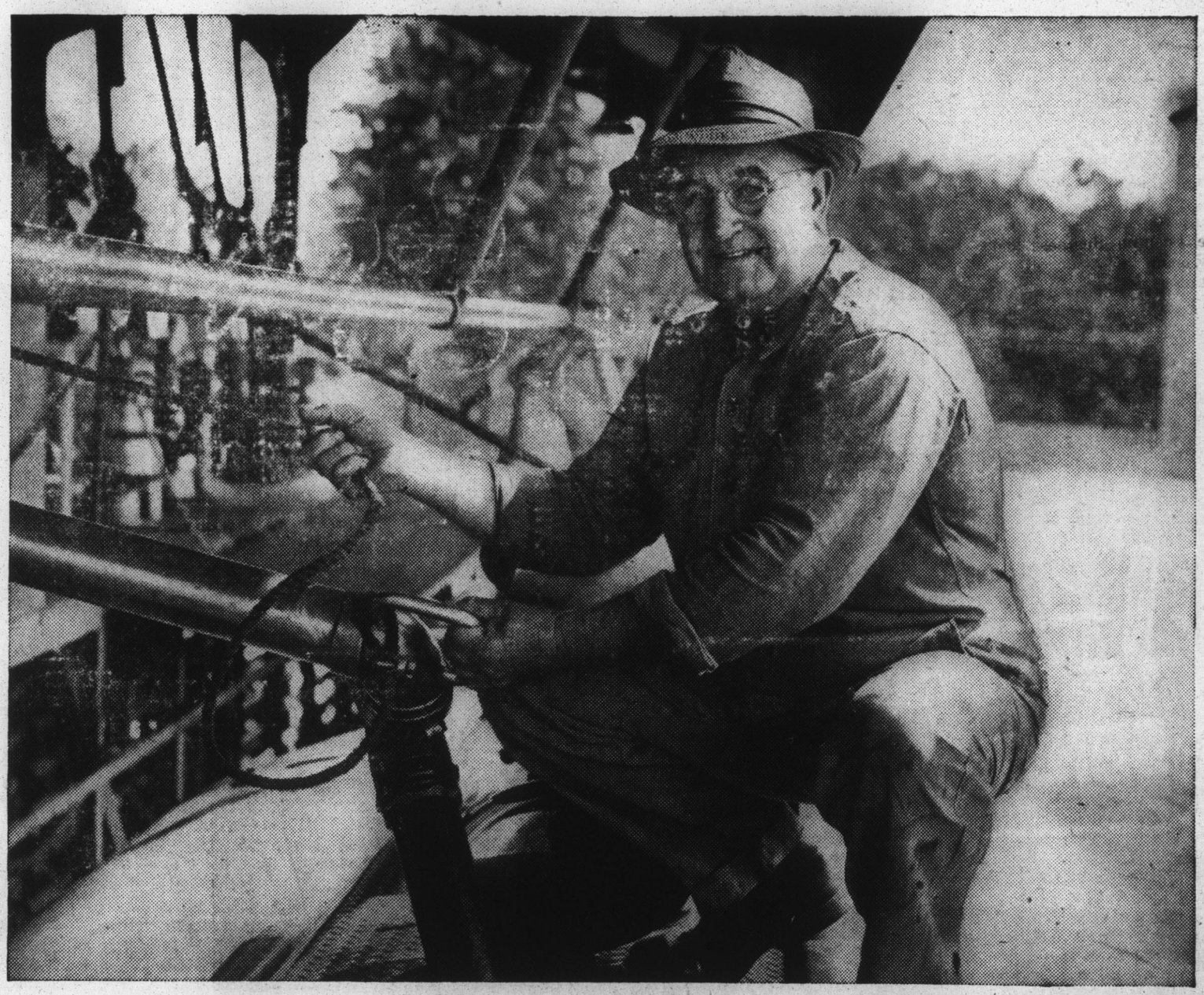
