

Chowan Tribe Elects Board Of Trustees

Three Chosen Due to Purchasing Property For Tribe

Due to Chowan Tribe of Red Men purchasing a building for use as a meeting place, it has been necessary to elect a board of trustees, which was done at Monday night's meeting at Hotel Joseph Hewes. The three elected by the tribe were L. E. Francis for three years, W. J. Daniels for two years and J. Edwin Bufflap for one year.

These trustees were authorized to execute proper papers for purchasing the Kehayes building next to the Broad Street Fish Market. No work on remodeling the building will be started by the Red Men until after the holidays. The second floor of the Broad Street Fish Market will also be rented, so that the tribe will have

adequate room for a home.

At Monday night's meeting officers were nominated, with the nomination remaining open until next Monday night. Only one nomination was made for each officer except the junior sagamore, for which there are already five nominations, M. L. Flynn, Horace White, J. H. Thigpen, Lloyd Parrish and John L. Goodwin.

Postal Service Faces Huge Holiday Rush

Public Warned to Mail Christmas Parcels At Once

With the normal mail volume at an all-time high, Postmaster General Jesse M. Donaldson warns Christmas mailers that unless they mail their Christmas parcels at once and their Christmas cards well in advance of Christmas week that they face the likelihood of not having them delivered until after Christmas.

Directing the attention of Christmas mailers to the fact that normal mail volume in the last several months has daily reached the proportions of the peak of the Christmas period a year ago, the Postmaster General said that this year's Christmas mail, added to the present everyday record volume, has created the most acute mail congestion and transportation problem in the entire history of the Postal Service.

Only by the immediate mailing of Christmas parcels, Mr. Donaldson said, can the senders be assured that their gifts will arrive prior to Christmas and thereby be in keeping with the spirit of the holiday season.

While every available means of transportation and extra facilities have been pressed into service, together with the employment of approximately 300,000 temporary employees during the holiday period, Mr. Donaldson emphasized that much of this advance preparation will have been in vain if the mailing public fails to place their Christmas parcels in the mails at once.

Mr. Donaldson said that the Post Office Department is relying on the mailing public to do its full part in cooperating in this year's holiday mail problem, the greatest ever to confront the Postal Service.

Fewer Vets Using GI Home Loans

Fewer and fewer veterans are obtaining home loans under the GI Bill, according to the Veterans Administration.

Records show that GI loans now number only one out of every ten new small home mortgages, compared with a one-in-four ratio during the peak period of the GI loan guaranty program.

The VA attributes the decrease in the number of veterans' home loans

to two factors: The high and rising price level for new homes and the four per cent interest rate—the maximum which lenders may charge veterans for loans guaranteed by VA under the GI Bill.

Regarding the first factor, VA estimates that the average veteran family can afford a home priced at \$5,000 to \$6,000, or well below the price asked for most of the new homes under construction. Relative to the second factor, VA explained that lenders are reluctant to invest in long-term loans permitting only a gross return of four per cent.
