Net Farm Income

Drop But Production Costs Remain High

Although the nation's gross farm therefore lower than in the previous year, says Moyle S. Williams, farm College Extension Service.

The decline is the first in 10 years.

At the present time, says Williams, come, the specialist adds, will be small this year unless increased efficiency and better management are employed to hold down costs.

Average prices received by farmers in January of this year were about 13 per cent below the record set in January, 1948. The index of wholesale commodity prices has continued down and in early January was 6 per cent below mid-August. Nearly all of the decline in wholesale prices has been on farm products and food; non-farm commodities have changed little.


