

## **Annual Tobacco Schools**

A series of schools held earlier this year for North Carolina tobacco farners proved to be unusually successful from the standpoint of both attendance and interest, reports R. R. Bennett, extension tobacco specialist at State College.

A total of 11,294 farmers attended the schools, which were held in 69 counties. Of the 108 meetings, 71 were held in 48 counties for both the White and the Negro farmers with an attendance of 1,857; 24 were held in 24 counties for Negro farmers only with an attendance of 1,857; and 13 on burley production were held in nine conuties with an attendance of 525.


