



Pich officiating. Born Febuary 18, 1924 young Habit was a life long resident of Edenton, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Habit. He attended Edenton High School and graduated from there in June prior to entering the Army. He was a member of Cannon Company, 359th Infantry.

Besides his parents, he is survived by five sisters, Miss Freda Habit of Edenton, Mrs. James Cannon of Raleigh, Mrs. Al Maroon and Mrs. Claude Griffin of Edenton, and two brothers, George and Al Habit of Edenton.
