Crop Off 50% But Price **And Quality Report**ed as Good

With the Chowan watermelon season at hand boats are beginning to put in an appearance in the Edenton harbor, three of the boats being docked as of Wednesday morning awaiting movement of the melons in quantity.

Prospects are not so bright for this year's melon crop in Chowan, due to damage by rain, which is estimated to have damaged the crop as a whole about 50 per cent.

County Agent C. W. Overman stated Tuesday of this week that while the watermelon acreage is larger this year in the county, the yield is expected to be from 50 to 60 per cent ss per acre. The bright side of the picture, however is that while the size has been affected, prices have been good and the quality of the
