Animal-drawn-motor vehicle collisions accounted for no fatalities this year but seven were killed last year. Bicycle deaths remained the same-16 during the first six months of each year.

Drivers in violation of the law numbered 8,324 and 10,873 violations were indicated. Speeders totaled 2,-143, with 127 in violation in fatal crashes, with 104 exceeding the speed limit and 23 exceeding a safe speed. A total of 1,720 were charged with driving on the wrong side of the road, not in passing. These drivers caused 74 fatal accidents. Drivers who did not have the right of way numbered 1,662 and were responsible for 25 fatal accidents. A total of 653 drivers were charged with driving intoxicated and caused 31 fatal accidents.


