

Fall Clean-up On All Farms Urged

Campaign Expected to Greatly Reduce Insects on Farms

A thorough fall clean-up campaign will do much to reduce the rapidly growing population of insect pests on North Carolina farms, says George D. Jones, entomologist for the State College Extension Service.

Jones asserted that infestations of boll weevils and other insects reached record levels during the past summer and immediate action is needed to reduce next year's crop losses from these sources.

"From all indications," he said, "the number of boll weevils going into hibernation in North Carolina will be the largest on record. This pest has caused serious—in fact, almost total losses in many parts of the State."

The entomologist said that destruction of cotton stalks before frost will reduce the number and vigor of the weevils going into hibernation. He urged farmers to plow under, disc or cut down the stalks as soon as picking can be completed.

Recent observations in abandoned tobacco fields show a very high population of flea beetles feeding on the plants, Jones said. He added that community cooperation in the destruction of the old stalks and crop residues during the early fall months should be especially helpful in controlling the beetles and many other pests.

The extension specialist said pickle

worms and several other vegetable pests have been very harmful this fall, and the Mexican bean beetle has been especially destructive in several commercial bean plantings. Prompt destruction of the plants by plowing will kill large numbers of immature forms as well as starve out others, he asserted.

In many cases, Jones pointed out, fall-seeded cover crops can be planted following fall clean-up operations.

Edenton Police Arrest 59 During September

According to the monthly report of Chief of Police George I. Dail, 59 arrests were made by Edenton police during September. Of this number, 49 were found guilty, two not guilty, three not prosed and five released to the military shore patrol.

As usual, drunks led the arrests at 19, followed by 11 for traffic violations. There were 35 white males arrested, three white females, 19 colored males and two colored females.

Fines, amounted to \$515.50, costs \$477.20, for a total of \$992.70, of which amount \$123.50 was returned to the town in way of officers' fees.

During the month 83 calls were answered, three auto accidents investigated, five funerals worked, 49 street lights reported out, 19 courtesies extended, two doors found open, two fires worked, 18 investigations made, four search warrants served, 18 cases of illegal wine destroyed, 963 radio calls made, as the result of which the police were on the air one hour, 20 minutes and 15 seconds.

Minutes Of Board Of Public Works

Edenton, N. C., Oct. 5, 1949. The Board of Public Works met this day in the Town Office at eight o'clock P. M. in regular monthly session. Present, J. H. Conger, chairman, J. A. Powell and Ralph E. Parrish.

On motion of J. A. Powell, seconded by R. E. Parrish, it is ordered that the water rates for Westover Heights be changed as follows: Minimum rate of \$2.00 for the first 1,000 gallons, to be reduced to \$1.60; the rate for the next 3,000 gallons to be reduced from 52 cents per 1,000 gallons to 42 cents per 1,000 gallons; the rate for the next 3,000 gallons to be reduced from 42 cents per 1,000 gallons to 35 cents per 1,000 gallons; the

rate for over 7,000 gallons is to be reduced from 36 cents per 1,000 gallons to 31 cents per 1,000 gallons. The above reduced rates will be effective on billings dated November 1, 1949.

On motion of R. E. Parrish, seconded by J. A. Powell, it is ordered that the property of the Virginia road pumping station site be disposed of by the chairman, J. H. Conger, and the Superintendent R. N. Hines to the best interest of the Electric and Wa-

ter Department.

On motion of J. A. Powell, seconded by R. E. Parrish, it is ordered that the contract to construct the foundations for the North Edenton whiteway at \$8.00 each unit be given to George Norris.

It is moved and carried that R. N. Hines be paid two weeks vacation pay in addition to his regular pay.

There being no further business, the Board adjourned.
