"Flyers" Leave Friday To Play Air Force In Bermuda

The "Flyers" from the Edenton Marine Corps Air Station lost a heart-breaker to the Fort Story, Va., squad on Hicks Field Friday night 13-12. Captain Jack Lee's boys were unable to keep up a sustained drive due to costly fumbles in the backfield. Though the Marines registered 11 first downs to Fort Story's six, they lacked the punch to score, as they were held back when within scoring distance. Friday the "Flyers" will fly to Bermuda, where they meet the Air Force team there. Next week the "Flyers" are scheduled to meet the Norfolk Naval Base, an East coast powerhouse, on the latter's gridiron.

Silver Dollars Are Flooding Edenton

National Guard Members Paid Off In "Cart Wheels"

At the last drill meeting of the members of the Edenton Heavy Mortar Company, 119th Infantry Regiment, received their quarterly pay checks in the form of silver dollars. Merchants were amazed as the men made purchases or paid off old bills with the hard cash, when \$2,200 of the "iron men" found their way into the normal business channels of the town. "This speaks more eloquently than words," said Capt. William P. Jones, commanding officer, "how this payroll of National Guard is no small consequence. The total amount of money released in the community is around \$15,000 a year. With our Company at full strength it would amount to around \$25,000 or \$30,000. The Edenton Heavy Mortar Company is not only rendering a service in protection, but is contributing to the payrolls of the town."

The Unit now has 71 men and four officers, and enlistments have been increasing by at least one member each week. There is every prospect that the full complement of 120 men will be reached, declared Captain Jones. The Guardsmen meet every Wednesday night at 7:30 for a two-hour training period.

153 Benefit By Old Age Aid In October

In Chowan County during October 153 persons received old age assistance in the amount of \$3,837. There were also 24 aid to dependent children cases receiving \$887.50 and 16 blind cases received \$267. According to the monthly report of Mrs. J. H. McMullan, superintendent of the Welfare Department, \$183.25 was spent for general assistance and other financial assistance included five persons hospitalized outside the county. Service cases included one adult parolee under supervision, two child labor certificates issued, 13 receiving care from Veterans Rehabilitation in cooperation with the Welfare Department, and 34 children receiving individual service.

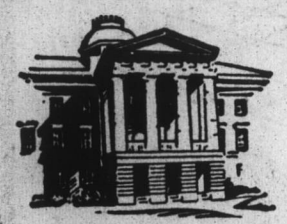
