

Large Number Vets Own Own Farms

Most Doing Own Work With Help From Immediate Family

Ninety-three per cent of the World War II veterans taking on-the-farm training under the GI Bill, as of the beginning of 1950, either owned their own farms or were operating farms which they in some way controlled, according to the Veterans Administration. The remaining 7 per cent were training on farms owned by others.

The total number of veterans in farm training was 347,000. Nearly all the veteran farm owners, Veteran Administration reported, had small family-type farms. The veteran on them did most of the work himself, with some help from members of his immediate family.

In this program, however, the farm must be large enough to meet the requirement of being properly equipped and large enough to keep the veteran busy on a full-time scale. It must also be productive enough to bring a satisfactory income, at least by the end of the training program.

Another requirement is that the farm is of a nature to permit instruction in all aspects of farm management, of the type in which the veteran is being trained. His agricultural instructor visits the farmer at regular

intervals for practical demonstrations and inspection, in addition to the weekly class room work which is required.

Wisely Appointed To Welfare Board

Governor Scott Will Be Requested to Make Proclamation

According to Neil Birch, executive secretary of the North Carolina Catholic Laymen's Association, a movement is under way to request Governor W. Kerr Scott to proclaim the hours of 12 o'clock noon to 3 o'clock

on Good Friday, the hours of Christ's agony, as a special time of prayer and recollection and that this time be further commemorated by closing of schools at this time and closing places of business (except essential public places) and amusement centers.

"In a world that is fast declining from the recognition of God and from the invocation of His name," says Mr. Birch, "we are hoping that this cooperative effort on the part of many Christians in North Carolina will bring home the significance of Good Friday to the people of our state."

Mr. Birch further says, "As a Christian nation it should be our desire not only to give recognition and thanks to God for our civil freedom

and prosperity, but greater yet to give thanks to Jesus Christ, the Son of God, for what was done some two thousand years ago, when He suffered a most cruel death in order that we might live."

Good Friday, the day which commemorates the death of Christ, will be observed this year on April 7.
