

Washington, N. C., First City Named After President

Herbert Bonner Proves His Point at Washing- ton Celebration

Washington, North Carolina was the first city to be named for the president of the United States.

They were the words of Congressman Herbert C. Bonner, a native of Washington, N. C., which has brought a good natured howl of questioning protest from mayors and representatives from Washingtons all over the nation.

The scheduled program for that portion of the Sesquicentennial Celebration honoring cities bearing the name "Washington" was interrupted while various representatives vowed their cities were the first to bear the name.

North Carolina's Congressman Bonner was victorious. But it wasn't easy. The Tar Heel Representative had to go back to the records of the Post Office Department to prove his point.

Mr. Bonner then accepted a plaque on behalf of Mayor Lewis Swindell, who was unable to attend the celebration, and the people of Washington, N. C.—the original Washington.
