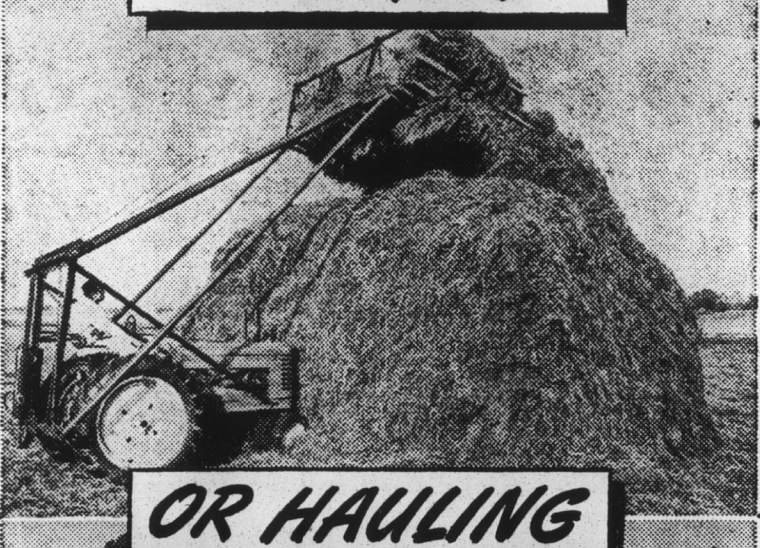

"The pageant is a wonderful revelation of early American history and wonderfully done," reports the group.

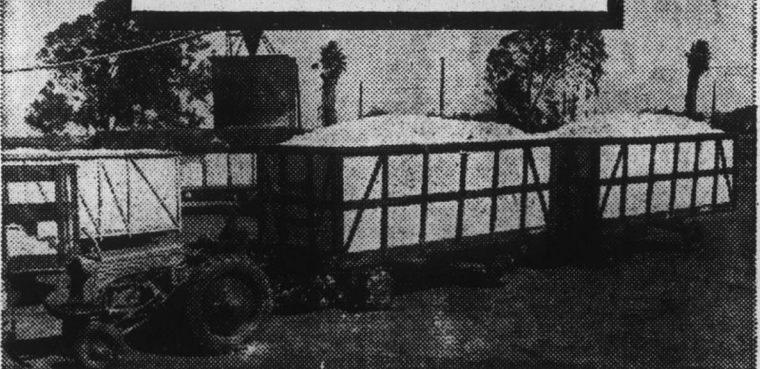

 Number 6 year molars extracted ----- 21
 Number repeaters worked for ----- 294
 Number of pre-school children worked for ----- 16
 Number of lectures on dental care ----- 47

Attendance at lectures ----- 1523

A most interesting point observed from the above figures is that 468 six year molars (permanent teeth) were filled by Dr. Koonce and only 16 had to be removed. After a few more weeks, nearly all of these 468 teeth would be lost—a good example of prevention.

Health Department officials offer the following advice:

Let's learn which teeth are permanent.

Let's watch for decay (cavities) in these permanent teeth.

When they first start to decay, let's see our dentist at once.

Let's see our dentist at least every six months.

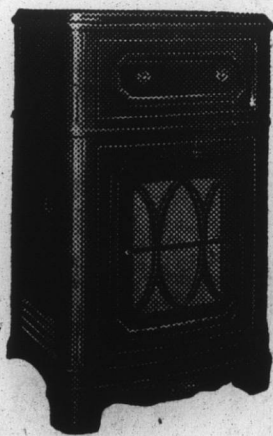

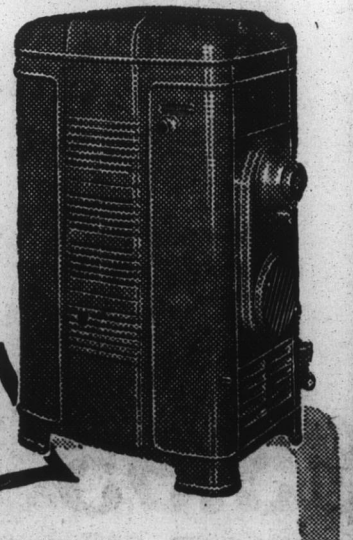
