

Widows of Vets Are Entitled To Federal Pension

Service Officer J. L. Wiggins Points Out Benefits Allowed

Widows of veterans of World War I whose income is \$1,000 or less a year are entitled to a pension of \$42 a month from the Federal Government, County Veterans Service Officer J. L. Wiggins points out.

Those widows with children under certain ages are entitled to extra compensation provided their income is not over \$2,500 per year.

Service by the veteran must have been between April 6, 1917, and November 11, 1918, and discharge or release from active duty must have been under other than dishonorable

conditions after 90 days or more of military service.

For the purpose of a pension a widow must have been married to a World War I veteran before December 14, 1944, or 10 or more years to the person who served, and must not have remarried.

District service officers of the N. C. Veterans Commission, County Veterans service officers and post service officers of the various veterans organizations are ready to assist or advise veterans or their dependents an all pension or compensation benefits, and a special campaign is being conducted by the N. C. Veterans Commission and the County Veterans service officers and the post service officers of all the various veterans organizations from September 15 to December 15 to locate and help all such eligible widows and orphans to file their claims properly.

Case Workers From District Hold Meeting

**12 Counties Represented
At Meeting Held on
Wednesday**

Case workers from 12 county departments of public welfare held a district meeting of their state Case Workers' Association in Elizabeth

City on Wednesday, September 13.

Counties sending their case work staffs to Elizabeth City for the meeting were Bertie, Camden, Chowan, Currituck, Dare, Gates, Halifax, Hertford, Northampton, Pasquotank, Perquimans, and Warren.

The meeting opened at 10 A. M., with discussion of a carefully selected Aid to Dependent Children case, occupying the morning session. Goldie Meekins of Dare County acted as discussion leader during this session, in which case workers discussed approved practices as reflected in the typical case and got a chance to offer con-

structive criticism.

After a luncheon recess, the case workers convened again at 1:45 and heard Miss Iris Flythe of Pendleton, district Field Representative for the State Board of Public Welfare discuss the possibilities of educational leave and scholarships for county welfare workers. Miss Flythe also led a discussion on handling school attendance problems referred to welfare departments, followed by Miss Irene Cox, child welfare Case Consultant for the State Board of Public Welfare, who gave the case workers an up-to-date picture of the effort being made

by the state toward the Midcentury White House Conference on Children and Youth, slated for Washington in December.

The meeting closed with a short business session. Emma Edwards of Pasquotank County is chairman for this district of the Case Workers' Association. The meeting was one of a statewide series, embracing all ten districts of the association, and the second to be held this year.
