

Edenton Aces Play Another Tie With Roanoke Rapids, 7-7

Third Tie Game Played During Current Football Season

Coach George Thompson's Edenton Aces hung up their third tie game Friday evening when they played a 7-7 tie with Roanoke Rapids on the latter's gridiron. Thus far this season the Aces have won one, lost one, and tied three games. The ties were played with Greenville, Elizabeth City and Roanoke Rapids, while they defeated Williamston and were defeated by New Bern.

Friday evening's game at Roanoke Rapids was a thriller, with each team scoring their touchdown in the waning minutes of the game. Playing on about even terms, both teams narrowly missed scoring a touchdown early in the game, and with only about six minutes remaining in the final quarter, Buddy Cannady received a Roanoke Rapids punt and raced some 75 yards to register the first score of the game. Gene Taylor's kick was good for the extra point, putting the Aces in front 7-0.

The Aces did not enjoy the lead very long, however, for only a few minutes later Batton for Roanoke Rapids passed to Stewart, which was good for a touchdown. The try for extra point was good, so that the score was tied with only a few more minutes to go.

Cannady and Mack Privott played a splendid offensive game, while Gene Taylor and Robert Twiddy looked best on defense.
