


Three Polio Victims In Chowan During Past Year

Richard Dixon, Jr., chairman of Chowan County's March of Dimes, announced this week that he had secured permission from Mayor Leroy, Haskett to allow all dimes deposited in the parking meters to go toward Chowan County's contribution. Of course, dimes do not register in the parking meters, but it may be possible that many will insert a dime occasionally during the remainder of the month of January while the March of Dimes drive will be in progress.

Chowan 'County's campaign got under way Monday of this week and although it is too early to tell how receptive people will be, Mr. Dixon sees no reason why Chowan County will not reach its quota of \$2,000. The March of Dimes this year is sponsored by the Edenton Junior Chamber of Commerce, with Jaycees acting as chairmen of the various areas to be canvassed. These chairmen save appointed groups of canvassers so that not too much of the burden will fall on any particular person. 




