"Feed the mother animals a balanced ration, providing animal proteins, vitamins and minerals, including lesume hav.

"Keep brood sows, cows and ewes ble and clean, free from mites, lice and filth.

"Have the new animals born on clean pasture or in clean, dry wellbedded quarters, free from chilly
